## Beit Lessin takes on 'Equus'

Years ago, all of England shuddered when a young man was accused of mutilating horses. This real-life event forms the base of Peter Shaffer's multi-award winning Equus (1973), which is currently enjoying a Broadway revival.

The drama centers around psychiatrist Martin Dysart and his patient, one Alan Strang, who stands accused of blinding five horses at the stable where he works on weekends. Initially Strang utterly refuses to cooperate, but very slowly, doctor and patient begin to establish a relationship – a relationship that obliges Dysart to look deep at his own demons as well.

UK playwright Peter Shaffer leapt to prominence with Five Finger Exercise in 1958. Other plays include The Private Ear, The Public Eye and The Royal Hunt of the Sun, which made him internationally famous.

The Beit Lessin revival is directed by Roni Pinkowitz. It stars Doron Tavori as Dysart and Dan Shapira as Strang. It opens October 30 at the Eretz Israel Museum in Ramat Aviv.
